Psagot Winery

Psagot Winery is located in the northern Jerusalem Mountains. The region has had an abundance of vineyards and wineries since ancient times, whose remnants exist even today. The Winery's barrel cellar is located in an ancient cave that was discovered during the process of establishing the winery. The natural damp conditions and constant temperature facilitate the high-quality aging process of the winery's wines.


The community settlement of Psagot is located on the peaks of the Benjamin Region Mountains, 900 meters above sea level, east of the city of Ramallah, overlooking the Wadi Kelt basin, the Jericho Valley, the Dead Sea and the Edomite Mountains. On the eastern side of the settlement, facing the breathtaking scenery, the Berg family planted vineyards and orchards. In the course of working the ground, an opening was discovered which led the family to an amazing cave from the period of the Second Temple. The cave was part of an ancient array of caves, which according to one archaeological version, equates the location with the Biblical city of Ai, one of the cities conquered by Joshua ben Nun. Slightly above the cave, a second cave was discovered in which an olive press and wine press from the Second Holy Temple era were uncovered.

Tanya Winery

The Tanya Winery was established in 2001 by Yoram Cohen as a family owned and run winery. Today, Yoram is majority owner and the winery's winemaker. The Winery is named after Yoram's daughter Tanya. The word "Tanya" appears hundred's of times in the Talmud when introducing a text related to the teaching of the sages.

The Winery is located in Ofra in the Binyamin Region north of Jerusalem at an altitude of 900 meters above sea level. The modern city of Ofra is named for the Biblical City located in the area inhabited by the ancient tribe of Binyanim (Benjamin), Jacobs youngest son, as mentioned in Joshua 18:23. Numerous ancient wine presses, some dating back 3000 years, carved in the stony regions surrounding the Ofra area serve as incontrovertible testimony to its centrality in the ancient wine making process. In the tradition of fine winemaking, the grapes which grow in the Winery's vineyards are harvested in optimal ripeness, fresh from the area's cool evening temperatures, placed in small containers, and dealt with only by hand.

Gvaot Winery



This winery is located in the Shomron in Givat Harel, Overlooking the ancient site of “Mishkan Shilo” and Wadi Shilo at 800 meters above sea level. The successful combination of love for wine and “Amuna Shalema” brought this boutique winery into being. The dream of the founders is to recreate the ancient “Winery Trail” that passed through this region leading up to Jerusalem. The remains of ancient wine presses gives witness to the fact that our ancestors prepared quality wine in this region.

The community of Givat Harel is located in the “Shiloh Bloc”, in the vicinity of ancient Shiloh. This area was the center for Jewish life when Joshua crossed into the Land of Israel. The vineyards are located in the area ranging from 700 to 900 meters above sea level. The combination of the rocky landscape, temperature differences between day and night and low humidity provide a unique quality of grapes that have produced award-winning wines.

Tel Shiloh

Tel Shiloh is a place of significant beginnings for the Jewish People, and even without the grand palaces or powerful walls, it is one of the most dramatic sites in the country. There, in the territory of the tribe of Ephraim, the children of Israel brought the Tabernacle (Josh. 18:1. making Shiloh a religious center for the Israelites even before Jerusalem.

The path to the ancient site of the Mishkan has a beautiful view of the valley where one of the most colorful stories in the Bible took place – the summer grape-harvest festival when the daughters of Shiloh came out dancing and the men of Benjamin sought brides from among them (Judges 21:15-23).

Visitors can stand at the exact place on Tel Shiloh where some scholars believe the Tabernacle stood. This would also be the spot where Hannah came to pray for a son. Later, she dedicated that son, Samuel, to serve in the Tabernacle. It was from Shiloh that the Ark was taken into battle and temporarily lost to the Philistines. Shiloh has a visitor center with an interesting model of the Tabernacle and an engaging audiovisual presentation.

Hills of the World Farm

This farm, located in Itamar is one of the most successful organic farms in the country. We will tour the farm and learn about the inner workings of the venture. Next, we will then go up to Kabir Mountain for a vista and explanation of this area so important to Israel and the Jewish Nation.

Return to Jerusalem

At each vinyard, guests will meet the vintners and hear its interesting and unique stories. The cost is \$150 per person which includes roundtrip transportation, wine tasting and lunch.
